Appointments:

A- Consideration and possible action re: Authorization for Request for Proposals for a Health Officer effective July 1, 2023 in the amount of \$30,000

Marena Works made this presentation as outlined above.

The Central Nevada Health District is required to have a health officer during the December 2022 meeting; Dr. Tedd McDonald was appointed on an interim basis to give time for the Board to recruit a permanent Health Officer.

This item will review the attached RFP to approve the scope of work and make any changes. Additionally, the Board will set the contractual amount to be paid for a health officer currently budgeted at \$30,000 per year and confirm that the Board will cover the Health Officer's medical liability for this service. The RFQ will open immediately and remain open for a minimum of 30 days or until filled, with board approval. Once a candidate has been selected, a contract will be presented to the Board.

Member Shannon Ernst made a motion to approve the Request for Proposals for a Health Officer effective July 1, 2023 in the amount of \$30,000. Member Tyson McBride seconded the motion, which carried by unanimous vote.

FISCAL IMPACT: Current budgeted amount is \$30,000

EXPLANATION OF IMPACT: The Health Officer acts as a consultant for the CNHD and may be asked to sign standing orders and prescribe medications as indicated for public health practice. The Health Officer will work directly with the Administrator under the board's direction.

FUNDING SOURCE: County/City contributions and various grants.

B- Consideration and possible action re: Amendment to the Interlocal Agreement Between the Central Nevada Health District and Churchill County which authorizes the Central Nevada Health District Board to approve the starting pay of employees that provide services for the Central Nevada Health District at any step on the approved pay scale for each employee position.

Jeff Weed, DA made this presentation as outlined above.

Amendment to the agreement with Churchill County for administrative functions on behalf of Central Nevada Health District pertaining to the hiring of Board of Health approval.

Member Larry Rackley made a motion to approve the Amendment to the Interlocal Agreement Between the Central Nevada Health District and Churchill County. Member Jim Barbee seconded the motion, which carried by unanimous vote.

FISCAL IMPACT: Potential increase in starting salary for employees that provide services for the Central Nevada Health District.

EXPLANATION OF IMPACT: Potential fiscal impact includes hiring employees that provide services for the Central Nevada Health District at an increased salary on approval of the Central Nevada Health District Board . Any funds used to pay those employees will come from the special revenue fund dedicated solely to all Central Nevada Health District revenue and funds which is kept and maintained separately from all other funds maintained and overseen by

Churchill County.

FUNDING SOURCE: Special revenue fund named the "Central Nevada Health District Fund" which is funded by the Central Nevada Health District.

Background

- Conversations with Nevada Division of Environmental Protection (NDEP)
- CNHD has statutory responsibility for water and wastewater inspections
- CNHD has the option to conduct solid waste inspection
- NRS Requirements:
 - NRS 445a.800-955 (public water systems)
 - NRS 444.616 (solid waste management)



Health District Collaboration with NDEP

- Health Districts (Washoe & Southern Nevada) conduct public water systems under NRS 445a
- Interlocal Agreement between health district and NDEP
 - Outline responsibilities and the funding arrangements
- There are currently 71 public water systems in CNHD
- Currently, funding the Interlocal is not possible
- NDEP has agreed to help CNHD develop the ability to perform this requirement over time



CNHD & Solid Waste Management

- NRS 445a requires wastewater inspection
- NRS 444.616 allows CNHD to assume responsibilities for solid waste management
- There are a total of 43 solid waste sites in CNHD
- This would allow for an allocation of money from tire sales to CNHD for the management of this program
- This is not something we recommend pursuing at this time

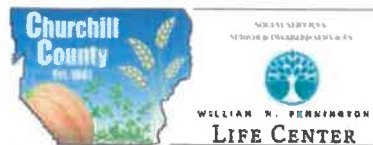

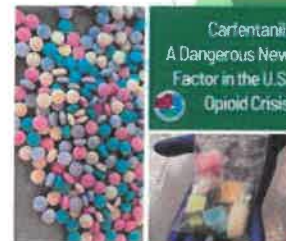
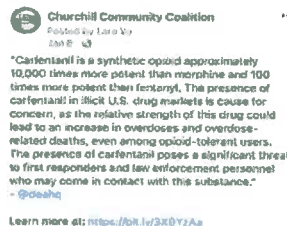

Update:

A- Consideration and possible action re: March 2023 Health Officers Report

Dr. Tedd McDonald, Interim Health Officer made this presentation as outlined above.

A monthly report from the health officer to update board members on recent activities.

Assembly Bills

- [AB37](#) – Rural Regional Behavioral Health Policy Board – Authorizes the establishment of the Behavioral Health Workforce Center of Nevada
 - Authorizes the Board of Regents to establish the Behavioral Health Workforce Development Center of Nevada at one more institution within NSHE. The center will consist of a main hub and regional hubs in each of the five behavioral health regions.
- [AB53](#) – Attorney General – Revises provisions relating to sales of tobacco products.
 - Increases penalty and violation structure for underage tobacco sales.
- [AB69](#) – Washoe Regional Behavioral Health Policy Board – Expands the loan program repayment program administered by the Nevada Health Service Corps to include certain providers of behavioral health.
 - Expands the eligibility of the Nevada Health Service Corp loan program to include behavioral health providers.
 - *Scheduled for hearing on 02/16 @ 1:30PM in Assembly Education*
- [AB108](#) – Assembly Committee on Commerce and Labor – Enacts the Nurse Licensure Compact
- [AB132](#) – Assemblywoman Cohen & Assemblyman Orentlicher – Creates the Committee to Review Overdose Fatalities

Senate Bills

- [SB35](#) – Attorney General - Establishes the crimes of low-level trafficking in fentanyl, mid-level trafficking in fentanyl and high-level trafficking in fentanyl.
 - Low-level trafficking: 4g or more but less than 14g, mid-level: 14g or more but less than 28, high-level trafficking: 28g or more.
- [SB92](#) – Senator Donate – Revises provisions relating to sidewalk vendors.
 - Sets forth requirements for the licensing and regulation of street food and merchandise vendors by the governing body of certain counties and cities. Prohibits a board of county commissioners to enact or enforce a complete prohibition on sidewalk vendors and impose a criminal penalty on the act of sidewalk vending. Creates the Task Force on Safe Sidewalk Vending in the Secretary of State's Office. The Task Force will be required to review existing laws related to sidewalk vending and recommend approaches to improve the laws of the State, cities, and counties to legalize sidewalk vending, simplify and standardize the laws governing sidewalk vending, remove unnecessary barriers to sidewalk vending and protect the public health, safety and welfare by ensuring sidewalk vendors follow clear and narrowly tailored laws which address demonstrable health, safety and welfare risks.
- [SB117](#) – Interim Health – Revises provisions relating to community health workers.
 - Prohibits a person from holding himself or herself out as a certified community health worker unless he or she is certified as such by the Nevada Certification Boards and establishes a \$500 civil penalty to be imposed against a person who violates that prohibition. Authorizes the Director to include in the State Plan for Medicaid coverage for services of community health workers who are supervised by other types of providers of health care.
- [SB118](#) – Interim Health – Revises provisions relating to public health.

- Removes the statutory requirement that counties who create a health district must be touching. Creates the Public Health Improvement fund and appropriates \$30 million for the biennium to DPBH to administer the account. The money will be allocated to health authorities in the State and authorizes the health authority to evaluate the public health needs of residents of the area under the jurisdiction of the health authority, determine the level of priority of the public health needs, expend the money in accordance with the levels of priority identified. Prohibits the health authority to not use money allocated to replace or supplant money available from other sources. Becomes effective July 1, 2023.
- *Scheduled for hearing on 02/17 @ 3:30PM in Senate Health and Human Services*
- **SB119** – Interim Health – Provides for the continuation of certain requirements governing insurance coverage of telehealth services.
 - Telehealth payment parity. Repeals expiration of telehealth coverage that was allowed during the COVID-19 Declaration of Emergency. Makes permanent provisions of existing law requiring a third-party payer who is not an industrial insurer to cover services provided through telehealth, except for services provided through audio-only interaction, in the same amount as services provided in person or by other means.
- **SB128** – Senator Seevers-Gansert, et al. – Revises provisions relating to fentanyl and certain related opioids.
 - Establishes crimes of low-level trafficking, mid-level trafficking and high-level trafficking in fentanyl, carfentanyl, any benzimidazole opiate and any mixture which contains any such controlled substance. Low level trafficking: 4 milligrams or more, but less than 6 mg. Mid-level: 8 mg and high level: 8 mg or more.

Update on Travelers Returning from Uganda

- On September 20, 2022, the Ministry of Health of Uganda confirmed an outbreak of Ebola (Sudan virus) in western Uganda.
- **Follow up for travelers from Uganda:**
 - CDC provides notifications of U.S. residents returning from Uganda as well as Uganda residents coming to the U.S. to visit.
 - Guidance released January 11th to end monitoring of all travelers.
- In total NV received 79 such notifications for travelers needing follow up
 - 1 was a CA resident and referred to CA
 - 4 Carson City
 - 66 Clark
 - 2 Lyon
 - 1 Nye
 - 5 Washoe
- 57 were successfully contacted
 - None developed symptoms during their monitoring period.

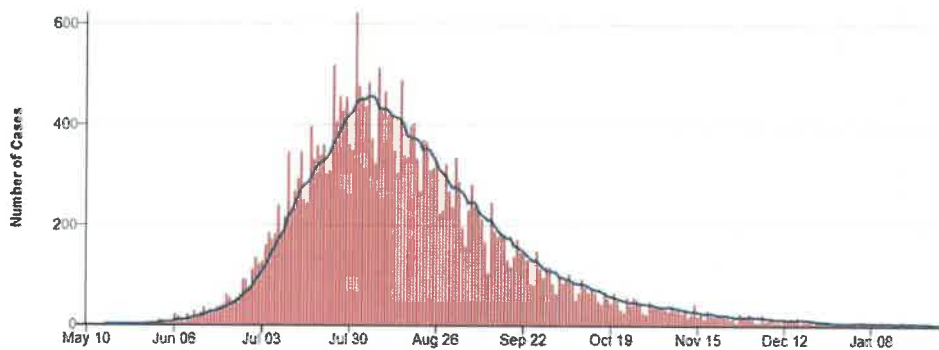

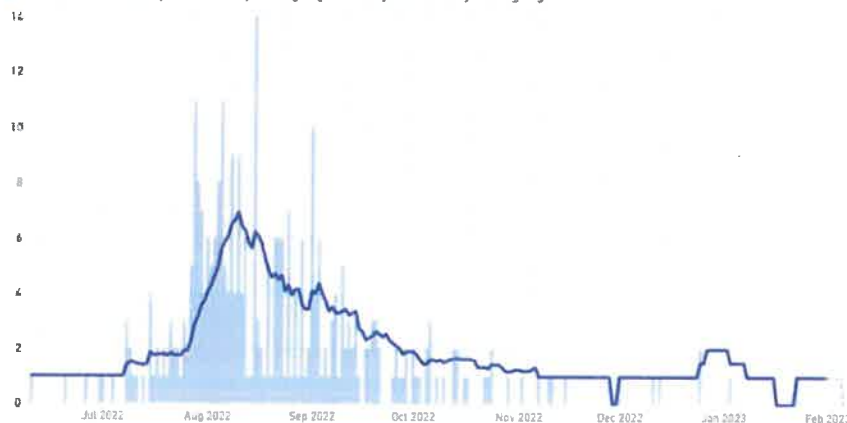
Nevada Mpox Cases Reported & 14 Day Moving Average

 - There is currently no evidence showing that people who never develop symptoms have spread mpox virus to someone else.

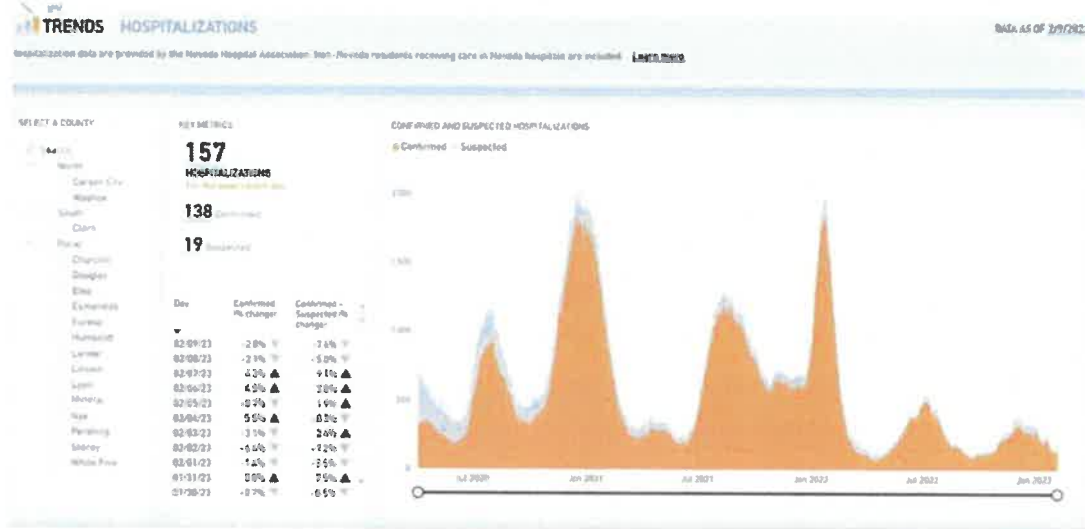

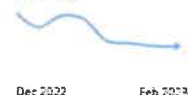

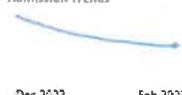

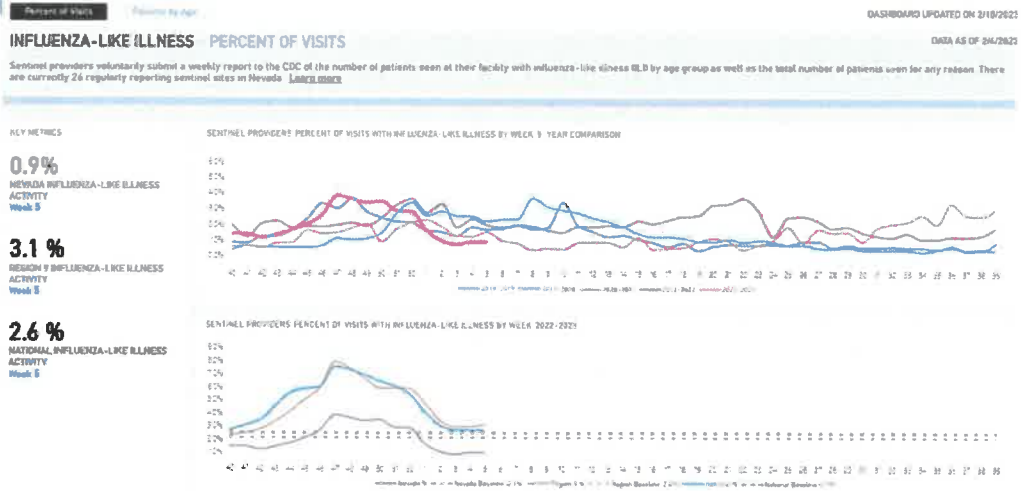

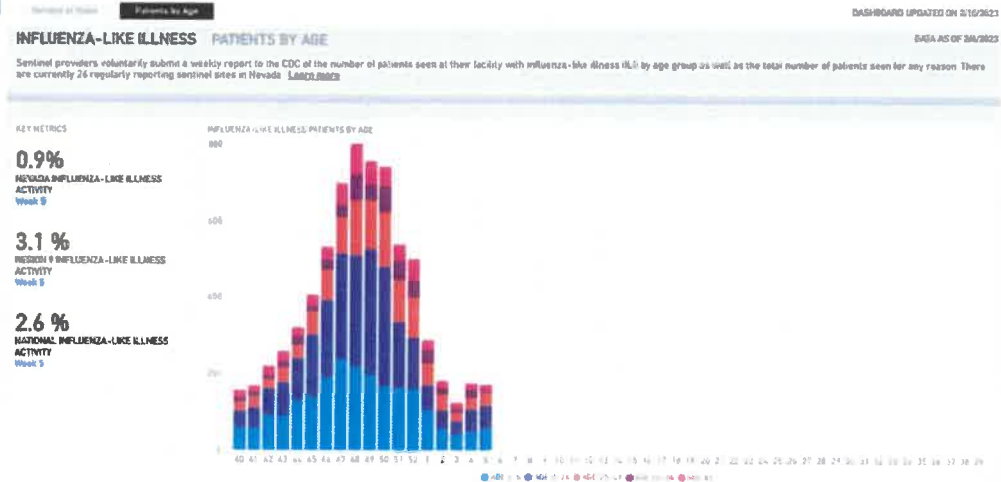

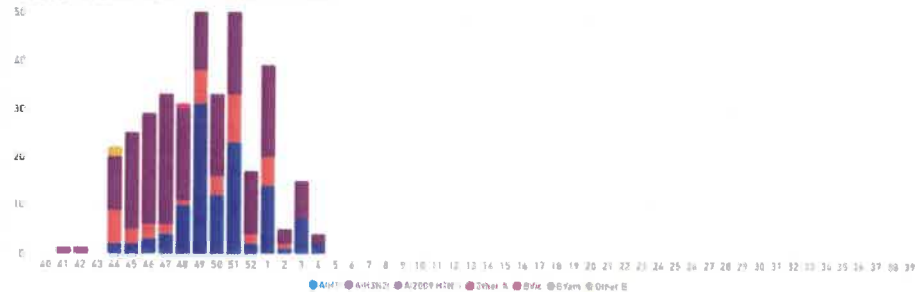

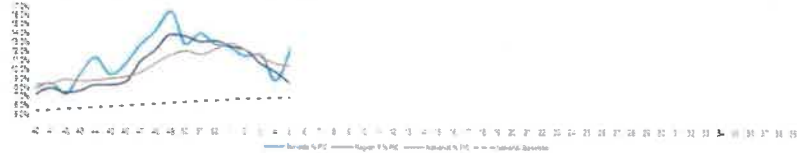

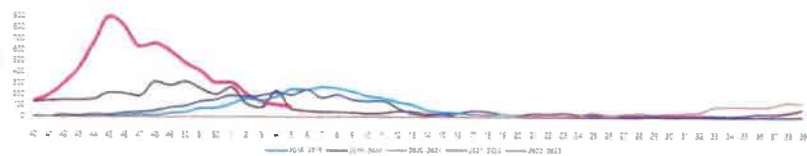
